In 1957, Chum and Lorraine Illig fell in love. Not with each other. That had already happened, followed by their marriage in 1956. No, they fell in love with bowling, and have spent their lives encouraging others to do the

Lorraine, now 87, said, "Since 1975, I've been teaching children age four and up how to bowl."

She retrieved a notebook and opened it on the wooden counter, made from an old bowling lane. "Here are the names of all the children I've taught. There may be more."

The notebook, labeled "Ogemaw Lanes Youth Bowlers 1975-2021," lists children in alphabetical order.

Lorraine said, "Sometimes I show this book to those in the current kid's leagues. I show them their name. Then I show them their parent's names. And for some, their grandparents."

How many children has Lorraine taught to bowl?

She smiles. "1,641 and some I haven't recorded yet."

One thousand, six hundred and forty-one young people who have not only learned to bowl, but have been taught the life skills that accompany those lessons. Along with hitting the sweet spot that results in a strike, Lorraine has taught them how to focus, be patient, pay attention, work together as a team, follow instructions, develop a skill set,

## Trust in God

"But about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, [a] but only the Father.

—Matthew 24:36.4.

When is the end of this age? Jesus predicted the fall of Jerusalem and the Gospel preached in the whole world. No one knows the day or the hour of His return, a purposefully vague prophecy. We keep watch, because we don't know on what day our Lord will come. But as the days of Noah were, so also will the coming of the Son of Man be. For as in the days before the flood, they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and did not know until the flood came and took them all away, so also will the coming of the Son of Man be. (Matthew 24:37-39)

Jesus confirms the Noah flood narrative. Does science prove it wrong? Are we sure? If the flood is a myth, how were transcontinental sedimentary rock layers formed? How were the Grand Canyon layers formed without any evidence of erosion between layers? How are whale and possum fossils found mixed together? Jesus includes a picture of normal life before Noah's flood. We can become deluded that we don't need to keep vigilant watch in prayerful preparation for his return. It appears that in apocalyptic times there may also be periods of normalcy. During those times watching will be even more


### **Mystic Michigan author Mark Jagers** to do presentation at West Branch District Library

# WBRC Operating Millage Renewal Proposal

Voters will be asked to renew the West Branch-Rose City Area School District's operating millage levy of 17.9532 on non-homestead properties at the polls on Tuesday, May 7, or by

absentee ballot beginning on March 28, 2024. This **GAIL HUGHEY** millage vote will be for ten years, which has been typical for our school district.

An operating millage generates revenue to support the general

school budget and would be renewed at the rate levied in 2023. This millage accounts for about one-third of our total school budget. The operating budget funds essential day-to-day

The non-homestead operating millage will have no effect on a homeowner's primary residence. The millage would be levied on businesses, second homes, vacant properties, and rental properties not otherwise exempt by law.

All registered voters living in the West Branch-Rose City Area School District can vote on this proposal at the polls on Tuesday,

# St. Helen American Legion Post 416 **Celebrates 75th anniversary**

## Renovations mark Legion's beginning 105 years ago

On March 15, 1919, members of the American Expeditionary Forces, still in Europe after World War I, met in Paris. The fruit of that gathering was the American Legion, which soon received a Congressional charter. Focusing on service to veterans, service members and communities, the Legion has evolved into one of the most influential nonprofit groups in the United States. Today, there are nearly two million members and more than 13,000 posts worldwide.

One of these posts is in St. Helen, Mich. Post 416 received its charter on April 11, 1949. For 75 years, veterans and their families have been meeting there for mutual support and outreach to the community. In the mid-1960s, members erected a building at 10062 Ford Dr. in St. Helen. Less than ten years later, the post had grown enough to build an addition to be used as a meeting hall for events and activities. Fifty years later, this much-used hall needed renovation.

Thanks to a generous donation from the Home Depot Foundation, which provided materials, equipment and labor, members gathered to begin the

work. Professional flooring installers from Home Depot worked alongside 30 volunteers as well as many other professionals representing local and not so local companies.

Helpers included MSC Builders, MAS Solutions, Custom Tile and Flooring, CG&G Lic flooring, John Steele, The Welding shop, Legionnaires of the American Legion Post 416, Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion Post 416, Sons of American Legion Post 416, American Legion Riders Post 416, Floor Source, Country Counter Tops Ortonville, and Commercial Electric Inc.

Volunteers arrived early and worked all day with a short break for lunch.
