To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the city of West Branch, Mike Hoadley, Michigan State Representative of the 99th District, read this proclamation:

"In the heart of Ogemaw County, where the west branch of the

Rifle River winds through forests and fields, lies the City of West Branch - an enduring symbol of resilience, charm, and community spirit. As we celebrate its 150th anniversary in 2025, we pause to honor a century and a half of rich history, steadfast growth, and

the remarkable people who have shaped its legacy. This sesquicentennial marks more than a date on the calendar - it is a celebration of the Civil War veterans laid to rest at Brookside Cemetery, the merchants who built the town's iconic

Fourth of July weekend is right around the corner and there are plenty of events scheduled across Ogemaw County to celebrate our country's independence.

In the city of West Branch, the annual parade is scheduled for Friday, July 4, at 6 p.m. through downtown. This year's theme is "City of West Branch Sesquicentennial Celebration."

The parade route starts at S. Valley St., and heads west on Houghton Avenue, to the Ogemaw County Building. To register to be in the parade, call the West Branch Area Chamber of Commerce at 989-345-282, visit online at www.wbacc.com or stop in the office, located at 422 W. Houghton Ave., West Branch.

Fireworks, courtesy of West Branch Township, are also



scheduled for July 4 at dusk, behind Walmart.

The Mills Township/Skidway Lake fireworks will be at dusk July 4, in Newman Park.

The annual parade is scheduled for Saturday, July 5, at 11 a.m. The parade route begins at Skunk Hollow Rd., and travels down to the Skidway Lake Chamber of Commerce (C.O.C.) building.

There's still time to register to be in the parade. If interested,

you must register with the C.O.C. Registration forms are available there or at the township hall by Monday, June 30.

On the evening of July 5 at dusk, Lake Ogemaw will host its annual display.

Rose City has lots to see and do for the holiday.

Beginning at noon on Thursday, July 4, the Kids Fishing Derby, for ages 14 and under, is scheduled. Registration begins at 10 a.m. at the back pavilion in the Rose City Park.

There will be games for the kids and food vendors set up in the park throughout the day. The parade is scheduled to begin at 4 p.m. and fireworks will light up at the sky at dusk.

Rose City Community Center plans underway

An exciting new project is underway for Rose City and the surrounding townships of Rose, Hill, Klacking, and Cumming. If all goes well, the former junior high school, which has been vacant for 13 years, will become the new Rose City Community Center.

"My husband and I graduated from there when it was a high school. I taught there when it was a junior high school. I hate to see it deteriorate," said retired schoolteacher Cathy Curtis. "It's a dream of mine to turn it into a community center."

To date, a purchase agreement has been approved, and the title work has been done. The city attorney has drawn up a contract which Rose City and two townships have already signed. The last two will be ready to sign by June 30, allowing the project to move forward.

Although the recreation program has used the second floor every summer, that space and other sections of the building will need to be renovated. The plan is to complete those in two phases. Phase One will include the gym, shower room and four classrooms. In the summer, these are already used four days a week, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Phase Two will require more extensive work, as much of that area had been stripped of items that could be used in other buildings. This area includes the cafeteria, kitchen, three classrooms and the library. When this is complete, the Rose City Library will move from its present location at 107 W. Main St. to the new community center.

Until resources are available to address the issues of the solid, but aging north wing built in 1942, it

West Branch author inspires hope in debut novel

Are there times when you feel you are just surviving, but not thriving? Sometimes all it takes is a reminder of your best self and a bit of support to turn things around. In her debut novel, "Comes Around," West Branch native Michelle S. Morris weaves a tale of the human connections that magnify strength, resilience and hope.

"I love impressionist art because even when there is darkness on the canvas, the artist is able to bring out the light. That's what I like to do with my writing," Michelle said. "No matter what happens in life or how dark it seems, there is always hope."

In "Comes Around," Michelle tells the story of fiercely independent and successful Halley who returns to her small Michigan hometown in shame after her life implodes in San Francisco. As escalating anonymous threats, betrayal, and secrets plague her, she has to decide who to trust and turns to her estranged multigenerational family and their extended motorcycle club dynasty. It's a journey of resilience, self-discovery, the enduring power of home, and transformation, of falling down and getting back up.

"Writing and telling stories has always been part of my life," Michelle said. "As a young girl, I used to go to Brookside Cemetery and sit at my great-grandparent's grave to write."

One of the fifth generation of the Richardson family who helped settle West Branch, Michelle graduated from Ogemaw Heights High School in 1981. She received a bachelor's degree in English and Political Science from Albion College, as well as a concentration in Public Service


"Specializing





"It's all come together," Carol said. "I'm really pleased."

The one disappointment of the event was the 1975 time capsule whose contents had been mostly destroyed by groundwater.

"The opening of the capsule and seeing what was buried 50 years ago was an exciting event that we were all looking forward to," City Manager John Dantzer said. "The seal on the cement vault must have failed... the contents were found to be severely affected with most of them being completely destroyed."

Despite the damage, the salvageable contents had been carefully digitized and printed in a binder for event goers to peruse. Many who knew their family had contributed items, stopped by the Sesquicentennial booth to view what remained.

"I was 12 when they placed the time capsule," attendee Michelle Morris said. "I remember wondering if, 50 years into the future, anyone would even know it was there. A lot of people from the community gathered to see what was going in it.

"I wasn't thinking about what life would be like when it was opened. Instead, I was thinking about my grandfather and what he thought 1975 would be like when he was a kid," she added. "That time capsule made me think about my ancestors and what they would have thought of their descendants and the town they made. I can't remember the items placed in the capsule, but I remember the community was

We may not have had all the 1975 items intact, but during West Branch's Sesquicentennial Celebration, there was an enduring commonality with those who set the time capsule in place. Like those West Branch folks 50 years ago, we, too, have a vital and involved community. Now that's a legacy worth celebrating.

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
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
