Join your friends and neighbors in Irons Park on Aug. 9 and 10 for the 45th annual Victorian Art Fair. This juried event, which features original handcrafted items shown by the artists, is not to be missed.

Of the 175 exhibitors, 30 are new this year, providing a mixture of old favorites and new opportunities for shoppers.

"Irons Park is a beautiful setting which allows visitors to not only enjoy the park, but the river that runs through it, and the children playing in the fort," said Marcia Young, chairperson of the Victorian Art Fair. "We have tried from the beginning to make this more of a family event than just an art fair. There are plenty of things for the kids, including games, boat races, minnow races, cherry seed spitting and a teddy bear picnic."

The Fair opens at 9 a.m. on Saturday. At 10 a.m., the Lighthearted Quartet will sing the National Anthem. Confirmed events and entertainment for Saturday include a Teddy Bear Picnic at 10:30 a.m., a baby contest at 11

a.m., face painting and balloon animals by Shriner Clowns at noon, and the Northern Blend Chorus at 2 p.m. On Sunday, Carol Ann's Dance Review will perform at 1 p.m. Both days will include a scavenger hunt for children and teens.

"We will confirm other activities closer to opening day," Marcia said. "Be sure to check at the information booth for a complete schedule."

As always, local nonprofit organizations will provide a selection of great food. The Knights of Columbus will serve breakfast burritos on Saturday morning. The Little League will serve hot dogs and nachos. Maxwell Therapy Center will have brats, burgers and pizza. For dessert, the Northern Blend Chorus will serve strawberry shortcake, and MyMichigan Volunteers will serve cream puffs. 










If you have been paying attention to the area, there have been a lot of improvements made. The Mills Township Parks and Recreation workers have been busy. You can stroll on the boardwalk and see there are new dog poop bag dispensers on both ends of the boardwalk to use as you're walking your pet. We have a lot of residents who walk their dogs on the boardwalk and we hope this will help keep the boardwalk clean.

There is new split rail fencing around the area to picnic at the boardwalk also. The workers fixed and installed new split rail fencing in Newman Park and out at the entrance of the driveway; it really looks nice. The chain link fence around the ball fields has been repaired and a couple of the small sheds have new roofs. It looks very nice with all the roofs being red.

The workers fixed the driveway into the park and the driveway to the walking path; no more puddles when it rains. Down the Rifle River Road to the pipeline the split rail fencing was done as well as Elbow Lake Park. We Library is open on the first and had a shoe tree that had become a nuisance, and the shoes were removed, and the tree looks nice

The Sterling Area Health Center fixed the huge low spot on Kathy Drive where a small pond would form after rain. Their employees had to drive through it to get to the employee parking lot. They did that at their own cost and it was greatly appreciated. They only ask for everyone to stay off their lawn with cars and ORV's due to the fact they have lawn sprinklers that can be damaged if something runs over them.

Mills Township will be recycling tires again this year. The dates are Aug. 23 and 24, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. It is for Mills Township residents, bring your ID. This year they will take tires on their rims. This is a great program to rid the area of old tires laying around that become mosquito breeding environments. Again, our Mills Township Parks and Recreation workers will be there to help you load the tires into the semi-trailers. This is paid for by a grant from EGLE (The department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy.) The company taking the tires is Geocycle, out of Dundee, Mich.

How are your gardens growing? If you don't have one, the farmers' market at the Skidway Lake third Wednesdays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Support our local growers. Also, at the Skidway Lake library the summer reading program is still available on July 23 at 1 p.m. and July 29 at 1 p.m.







Hospitals receiving the Improvement Award participated in the annual Leapfrog Group survey and demonstrated improvement in letter grades for four consecutive grading terms with Hospital Safety Grade (Spring 2023, Fall 2023, Spring 2024, Fall 2024). During the four terms, the grades must not trend backwards. The last term grade (Fall 2024) must be at least a "B" to qualify, and hospitals must improve by two letter grades during the four terms.

Employers, patients and their families are often responsible for the costs that occur when an adverse event happens during a hospital stay - creating a preventable financial burden," said Bret Jackson, EAM President. back is one of her strengths. Curiosity, faith in herself and the willingness to work hard are others that will help her reach her goal.

To find an appropriate summer job, Danycca asked Michigan Works! for help. Instead of a typical teen job working fast food or retail, they offered her a six-week internship in the Ogemaw County Prosecuting Attorney LaDonna A. Schultz's office.

"This is not like you see on television where a case is finished in an hour," Danycca said. "I've had the chance to read through some actual cases, and two things stand out: how long the process takes and how many people do not show up for court. I am learning a lot."

Danycca has not yet chosen a college, but when she does, she will enter as a junior.

"Since a bachelor's in pre-law is not available, I want to major in philosophy and ethics," she said. "I love debate, and I've enjoyed the ethics classes that have been part of my associate's degree. I'd like to attend a small school and develop my critical thinking skills before law school."

Danycca is not unlike others who Schultz has mentored in her office.

"We've fostered quite a few interns over the years," Schultz said. "We like to mentor local students so they can reach their professional goals. Our current assistant prosecutor interned with us, as did the District Court magistrate. Courtney Brant is currently studying forensic science at Indiana State, and Libby Hodges is starting law school in the fall.

"We offer our interns a wide range of experiences, including job shadowing in and out of the courtroom, ride-a-longs with the police, a tour of the Grayling crime lab, a tour of the jail and interviews with Department of Corrections personnel," she added. "As an elected official, I never forget that being in this position is an honor and a privilege. One way I can serve the community is by mentoring young talent. Danycca is super smart, and she has been a great asset in the office. I hope her time here helps her keep going forward with her academic degree."

Unlike most previous interns, who have worked only for the experience, Danycca's six-week opportunity has been paid for by Michigan Works!

"When Michigan Works! said they could find me an appropriate summer job, they really did," Danycca said. "I am extremely grateful for my internship in the Ogemaw County Prosecuting Attorney's office. My goal is to become a prosecutor myself."


