### Speaking up to save lives:

### Local woman's breast cancer journey



In November 2024, Dana Grav, a retired Whittemore-Prescott Elementary School teacher, became Heartland Hospice's volunteer coordinator. Sixty years young, she is the perfect person to support volunteers, bring joy to her patients and model hope and resilience for the rest of us.

Then she got some bad news. Here is her story in her own

"When you asked me to talk about my breast cancer experience, I wasn't sure I could do it," said Dana. "Then I remembered something that happened when I was eight months pregnant.

As our lawn was being mowed, my four-year-old son and I were outside talking with the neighbor. Suddenly he ran in front of the lawnmower, and when it hit him, he slipped underneath. Thankfully, the blades were not running. I ran to him to pull him out. His foot had been badly cut. When

Alex Rose, an Ogemaw Heights High School alum with dual citizenship in Samoa, has just made history. At the World Athletics Championships in Tokyo, Rose, a 33-year-old discus thrower, secured Samoa's first ever global medal in athletics with a throw of 66.96 meters for bronze. Translation: He threw a 4.4-pound discus 219.68 feet.

"I started throwing discus when I was 16," Alex said. "I'd primarily played football, and did track as a side sport. I fell in love with discus. Unlike team sports, where if something doesn't go right you can blame the offense or defense, discus is cut and dry. The circle is the same size. The discus is the same weight for everyone. How far are you going to throw? Are you better than your competitors? It's just you and the circle."

Alex's former coach at OHHS, Douglas Grezeszak, said, "Alex is the nicest guy. I've followed his career since he was in high school. Over the years I've

attended some of his competitions around the country.

"I love to watch him throw. As a retired physics teacher, I've often joked with Alex that throwing a discus is really just an applied physics experiment," he added. "I guess that's why I like it so much."

At Central Michigan University, Rose continued to compete. In 2011, he earned All-American honors with a fifth place showing. The following year, he won the Mid-American ence crown.





has dual citizenship. Proud of his Sāmoan roots and wanting to pay homage and respect to the community that shaped his family heritage, in 2012, Alex chose to represent the Polynesian Island nation.

In 2016, Rose achieved the Olympic standard. This opened the door for invitations to larger meets all over the world, as well as the opportunity to compete in the Olympics in Rio de Janeiro in 2016, Tokyo in 2021 and in Paris in 2024, where he reached the finals, finishing in 12th place.

addition to being

world-class discus thrower, Alex which is a challenge to schedule." is a dad and husband.

"Family is so important in Sāmoan culture," he said. "Being a dad to my sons, three-year-old Aleki and five-month-old Tailua, and husband to my wife, Samantha, is the most important part of my life. In order to maximize my time with them, I keep a very efficient schedule of workouts and technique practice. We have a gym at our house, which allows me to use the early morning hours and late nights to lift three to four times a week. I also practice throwing four times weekly,

Alex and his family now live in Grand Rapids. He works full time as a technical sales engineer for Phoenix Contact, often having to juggle trade shows and discus competitions strategically to fulfill responsibilities for both.

"Because I am the first to medal under the flag of Samoa in a world event, I've been invited to meet the Prime Minister," Alex said. "I had to tell him I couldn't make the trip until I had accrued more personal days at work."

The 2025 World Athletics Championships were not the first time Rose had competed in To-

"In 2021, the Olympics were in Tokyo," Alex said. "I had a very bad performance. I didn't make the final. It was the last competition of my 20's. Having that failure and not achieving my goal really motivated me to be a better athlete. Mentally, what do I need to do to perform at the biggest moments? Physically, how do I prepare to have better technique? Year by year, I chipped away at that, and to get the redemption in the same stadium, in the same city, in the same circle four years later, is overwhelming. I am so thankful."

On Sunday, Sept. 21, the day of the men's discus throw final, rain pelted the field, causing a two-hour delay. It was still raining when the competition began. Rose slipped in the circle on his first throw. Then, on his fifth throw, he made history.

"It felt like a dream," Alex said. "When I looked up at the scoreboard and saw my name as the bronze medal winner... I'm still in shock. The officials began frantically looking for a Sāmoan flag, but they didn't have one because they'd never needed one. Then

my sister, who had come to watch me throw, pulled one out of her purse. I think she'd bought it on Amazon. She passed it down to the officials, who passed it to me so I could make my victory lap carrying our flag."

To young athletes, especially those from Ogemaw Heights High School, top-tier discus thrower Alex Rose offers this advice:

"Find something you love and are passionate about. Become a true student of the sport. Ask advice from those you respect and take it. Work hard and hone your craft. You will feel the most rewarded if you do this."

To the people of Ogemaw County, Alex shared this:

"I have fond memories of growing up in West Branch. I loved going to the Ogemaw County Fair and seeing the fireworks on the Fourth of July. Ogemaw County was a magical place to grow up, where I made lifelong friends. I truly cherish the community."

To Alex Rose, world-class discus thrower, from his hometown:

We cherish you, too. You embody the values inherent in our community: a strong family, a great work ethic and the grit not just to overcome, but to thrive. We join the rest of the world in applauding your success and wish you all the best in the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.



the ambulance arrived, a reporter, who had been monitoring emergency calls, showed up, too. My white shirt was covered in blood, and while the EMTs were checking me out, the reporter asked if he could interview me about the incident. I declined.

The next day, I heard on the news that another child had just gotten hit by a lawn mower and had died from his injuries. I've always wondered if I had been willing to speak up that day about the dangers of mowing near children, might my words have saved his life.

Remembering that, I am willing to put my concerns aside and talk about my journey with breast cancer, in hopes that my words and my experiences will save lives.

Every year I dutifully went for my mammogram. I never skipped. I didn't think breast cancer was going to happen to me. I went because I was supposed to go. Then, at the end of last year, my doctor said I needed a follow-up ultrasound. Not worried, I complied. When they called me in for a biopsy, I still wasn't worried. Breast cancer didn't run in my family, and I felt fine.

A week later, after a staff meeting at work, I found a phone message from my doctor. 'I know you have good news for me,' I said when I returned the call. 'Unfortunately, I don't,' was the re-

I walked out to my car and cried. It took me several days before I could tell anyone. My son received the news stoically. The hardest person to tell was my daughter. Her response was not what I expected. She remained positive and supportive and told me we'd get through this together.

It was 10 weeks before I could have the surgery. There are a lot of people with cancer, and a limited number of appointments available. During that time, I received counseling about radiation and chemo if I needed it, what to expect post-op, and what follow-on treatment I would need.

Thankfully, the cancer was contained and found early, so I knew I wasn't going to die. Still, I needed to undergo radiation to ensure none remained. I had 16 sessions, one every weekday in June. The process took only 15 minutes. I'd change my clothes. They'd strap me to a table. A spaceship-looking device would float over me for a few minutes. Then I'd get dressed and go to work.

Radiation was the worst of it. On the first two nights of my treatment, I slept for 12 hours. I had no appetite for weeks. I was constantly exhausted. It felt like my soul had been sucked out of me.

During this difficult time, though, I received the best of care from the radiology team at MyMichigan. They are the kindest people. They made sure I was comfortable, had soothing music to listen to instead of the whirring of the machines. On the last day of treatment, they even held a small ceremony. I rang the bell to signal that I had completed the course. They even gave me a certificate. Their sweetness made a tough time bearable.

I am now five weeks past my last session of radiation. I finally feel like myself again. My energy and appetite are back. I will still go for periodic check-ups and take medication for the next five years, but I am cancer-free and have a lot of living to do.

Cancer is a life experience no one wants. In the past, a C-word diagnosis was a death sentence, but that's not true anymore. My advice is for everyone to get their required annual check-ups, not be too afraid to bring issues to the doctor's attention early, and follow through on what the doctor says. It's awful to receive bad news, but we must keep ourselves in check. Most issues are treatable or at least manageable. We are all stronger than we think we are."

Thank you, Dana Gray, for sharing your personal experience and insight.

According to the American Cancer Society, one in eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. In 2025, an estimated 316,950 women and 2,800 men will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer, and an additional 59,080 new cases of non-invasive (in situ) breast cancer will be diagnosed. When caught in its earliest, localized stages, the five-year relative survival rate is 99 percent. Advances in early detection and treatment methods have significantly increased breast cancer survival rates in recent years, and there are currently over four million breast cancer survivors in the United States.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month. The purpose of this global campaign is to normalize conversations about breast cancer, encourage periodic self-examinations and mammograms, and provide critical support for patients and survivors. Since it began in 1989, Breast Cancer Awareness Month and similar campaigns have helped reduce breast cancer deaths in the United States by 44 percent.
