

Three well-attended Veterans Day events in West Branch honored those who served in the Armed Forces with heartfelt ceremonies and the opportunity to share a meal together.

On Nov. 11, at 8:30 a.m., the entire student body gathered in the Ogemaw Heights High School gym to pay tribute to the veterans who are part of their extended families.

Grandfathers, moms and dads sat center-court while the students regaled them with a program of music and

Roosevelt in 1910, received many nods from the veterans. It began with these words: "It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena." Following the other well-received readings, the veterans enjoyed a hearty breakfast in the library accompanied by their students. Thank you to Assistant Principal Jason Pilarski for organizing this event.

At 11 a.m., the Veterans Alliance held a luncheon at Lumber Jack Lodge to honor Veteran of the Year Randy Huyck. The event began with an outdoor ceremony led by the Honor Guard, then continued indoors for presentations and a delicious meal.

During his presentation, State Representative Mike Hoadley said, "Armed Services Day is for those wearing the uniform. Memorial Day is for those who died in uniform. And today, Veterans Day, is for those who have worn the uniform... Standing here with my brothers and sisters reminds me of what being a veteran means. When we hear the National Anthem, when we recite the Pledge of Allegiance, those become sacred to a veteran, and the patriotism flows. And Taps... the echoing eerie sound of taps haunts our very soul... It is my distinct honor to be here today. With a shared commitment to the noblest ideas of our country, I join the Ogemaw County Veterans Alliance in congratulating Randy Huyck, as I present him with this State of Michigan tribute."



**Community****Curator finds family histories**

I am really excited about getting all these phone calls from people about helping them find their information on history. I love it. I have people who I knew years ago come to the museum and I can help them.

The first person who I met with was Robert A. Code from Vicksburg, Mich., and he was looking for his ancestry from the Potts family from the lumbering days with information on his mills and lumbering days. Grace Dooley gave me information on where to look for this history in the Wilderness Chronicle with an index which told me what volume to look in.

By the time Robert got here I had pages of information to share. LuAnn Zettle is also working on the Potts family, so I shared the information I had shared with Robert, and she gave me a stack of pictures for him, and I mailed them out today. Last Friday the museum received a nice, sizeable check from Robert for my time and information.

I have also been working on the old Albert Johnson horse ranch. The finest horse ranch in northeastern Michigan located three and one-half miles west of West Branch on Pointer Hill. I am still

waiting to hear from some people on what they can tell me.

The second story is on Elizabeth (Betty Toutant) on her visit to the museum with her two daughters. The third story is on visitors from Lee's Summit, Mo., who drove all the way to West Branch to find the history of her father, Mr. Takacs, who owned the old building call the "Opera House," also known as the "Night Owl Coney" and turned it into a roller-skating rink with

a fine restaurant with easy food. Plus Mrs. Takacs sold records. This was in the 1950s. Bette Jo Takacs Jones, the daughter of Mr. Takacs, could not believe her eyes that a fountain had replaced the old building, and I shared the pictures we had of the fire of the old building. Her father also owned "Cadillac Coach" at one time. These stories will come up later in the Ogemaw County Superior News. Be sure to watch for them.

I will be doing the wrap-up of Amy Gildner Fransee on the "Dig" she has been working behind on their property since 2020 of an old cabin foundation and its

sidewalks, refreshed storefronts, and widened pedestrian paths make downtown fully walkable, inviting guests to take in the sights at their own pace. The area will be adorned in holiday flair, with garlands, wreaths, and twinkling lights creating a postcard-perfect backdrop for a night of exploring art and wine.

Guests will stroll from shop to shop, where local artists will transform participating businesses into pop-up galleries. Painters, woodworkers, potters, photographers, and mixed-media creators will display an array of handcrafted pieces — from festive pottery

to nature-inspired paintings and photography.

As Thanksgiving approaches, the Ogemaw Heights High School Health Science program has much to be thankful for this year. Our students and staff would like to extend heartfelt appreciation to the local community for supporting the May 2022 bond proposal, which made significant improvements to our learning environment possible.

Thanks to the bond's approval, Health Science students now learn in a fully renovated classroom and state-of-the-art skills lab. The upgrades include eight new hospital beds, three advanced mannequins, and a newly constructed shower area that allows students to practice safe and realistic patient care techniques.

Ogemaw Heights Career Technical Education (CTE) department provides a wide range of hands-on learning opportunities for students, offering programs in Construction Trades, Machine Tool/Machine Shop, Drafting and Design Technology, Health Science, Agriculture, Work Based Learning, and Business Management Administration with plans underway to introduce a culinary program in the near future.

Within the Health Science pathway, first-year students enroll in Medical Basics, a foundational course that introduces every major body system. Each unit covers medical terminology, anatomy and physiology, diseases

and conditions, diagnostic and treatment procedures, and related career paths. This course serves as an excellent starting point for students considering a medical career, as well as those who simply wish to better understand their own health and how to care for their bodies.

Second-year students advance to Healthcare Provider, a two-hour course that prepares them to become Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs). Students learn essential clinical skills, the importance of proper infection control,

Whether mentoring younger members, presenting at the county fair, or participating in statewide events like 4-H Exploration Days, Ogemaw youth are gaining experiences that prepare them for college, careers, and civic life. Many adults in our community are 4-H Alumni and are powerful examples of how learning new skills, overcoming

challenges and building internal resilience, and sustaining relationships have helped them in their own growth and transition to adulthood.

Research shows that 4-H youth are twice as likely to aim for leadership roles and three times more likely to serve their communities compared to their peers. That's a powerful impact and it's happening right here in Ogemaw County.

## MyMichigan Medical Centers receive safety grades

The Leapfrog Group, a national watchdog for health care quality and safety transparency, has released new safety grades for hospitals. The organization assesses performance across 22 individual safety measures and calculates an overall safety score determined by a scale which they use to assign a grade.

The Fall 2025 grades for MyMichigan Health Medical Centers are as follows: MyMichigan Medical Centers in Alma and West Branch earned their fourth consecutive "A" grade; MyMichigan Medical Center Saginaw improved, also earning an "A"; the Medical Center in Alpena achieved a "B" and the Medical Center in Midland improved to a "B." While MyMichigan Medical Center Sault maintained a "C," this was its highest overall safety score determined by scale in recent years. No grades are calculated for the Medical Centers in Clare and Tawas where measure volumes did not meet scoring eligibility, or for critical access hospitals like the Medical Centers in Gladwin and Standish.

Leapfrog evaluates hospitals every spring and fall using a comprehensive survey to assess that hospitals are meeting rigorous safety standards. Patient experience and safety outcomes data supplied by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) are also used. For the 2025 fall grade, performance predominantly from calendar years 2022 to 2024 was assessed. The average national grade is a "C."

"We understand the new grades are a look backward where Leapfrog is measuring past performance from two or three years ago," explained Kevin Kalchik, president of MyMichigan Medical Center Sault, where the hospital's rates for falls and clostridium difficile infections during that time contributed to its "C" grade. "We use that information to compare to



# 700 Club raises funds for Michigan veterans

The Northern Michigan 700 Club, Chapter 101, held its third annual Patriot Benefit Bash on Saturday, Nov. 8, at Ogemaw Lanes in West Branch. The club's membership is open to bowlers who have scored 700 or higher in a three-game series in league or tournament play. During the event on Saturday, several of these elite bowlers even scored perfect 300 games. While they enjoyed one another's company and another chance to compete, this gathering had an even greater purpose.

Tournament director Barry Massey said, "Our goal is to raise money to support the Michigan Wounded and Returning Warrior Program. In our first year, we raised \$1,344. Last year it was \$4,600. We hope to double that this year. We are really thankful to the many local vendors who have given us items for our silent auction."

Though they didn't quite meet their goal, an amazing \$6,525 was raised this year.

The Michigan Wounded and Returning Warrior Program is a multi-faceted project of the Michigan American Legion Foundation, which provides comprehensive assistance to military families and wartime veterans in need. Through their website, veterans can apply for temporary emergency financial assistance, a short-term individual or family retreat at a Michigan resort, or a group PTSD retreat. The MWRWP also provides reintegration assistance for veterans and presentations on PTSD and combat trauma to

Between games, members of the 700 Club listened to a presentation from Jonathan Turnbull, a graduate of West Point and a local wounded warrior. Jon lost his sight in Syria in 2019, when an ISIS suicide bomber ran at Jon and his team and detonated.

"We put together a cross-functional team. ... a Naval Intelligence Senior Chief, Navy SEALs, Naval Special Workers, a Petty Officer Second Class, three Army Special Forces Green Berets. I was the team leader, a Civil Affairs Officer in Special Operations."

The team was sent to northwest Syria to complete a three-fold humanitarian mission: renovate a hydroelectric dam to restore power to 450,000 people in Turkey,

hospital and had over 20 surgeries.

becomes a chance to breathe. The messy kitchen becomes a reminder that your home is full of life.

Food for thought: When you start with thanks, you see the day differently.

2. Look for the Gift in the Grind

It's easy to be thankful when life goes smoothly; it's harder when the grind feels relentless. But gratitude has a way of redeeming frustration — not erasing it, but reframing it. Next time you face something irritating or inconvenient, pause and ask: "What could this teach me?" or "What might God be forming in me through this?" The delay, the difficulty, the deadline — they can all hold unexpected lessons in patience, humility, or endurance.

When we find the gift in the grind, gratitude stops being a reaction to good times and becomes a way of seeing all times.

Food for thought: Gratitude doesn't remove the grind; it reveals the grace inside it.

3. Speak Gratitude Into the Noise

In a world full of complaints, gratitude spoken out loud is a radical act. Try making it a daily goal to tell one person what you appreciate about them — a co-worker, spouse, child, or even a cashier. Saying "thank you" doesn't just bless others; it rewrites your own heart. It reminds you that you're

not alone, that good still exists, and that kindness multiplies when it's voiced. It also cuts through negativity like light through fog. The more you speak gratitude, the less room there is for cynicism to take root.

Food for thought: Gratitude unspoken is encouragement withheld.

Gratitude doesn't need perfect circumstances to grow — it needs intentional awareness. When we practice thankfulness on ordinary Tuesdays, not just on Thanksgiving Thursday, we discover something sacred: life isn't lighter because we have less to carry, it's lighter because our hearts have learned to see differently.

So this year, between the turkey and the to-do list, try slowing down long enough to give thanks — not just for what's on your table, but for the unseen grace in every corner of your life. Because even in the daily grind, there's always something worth noticing, something worth naming, and something worth thanking God for.

Closing feast: Gratitude doesn't just change your day — it changes the one living it.



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


-Keep snow away from fire hydrants so they remain visible from all sides at all times.
