**A legacy of grit:
Father and son earn Golden Helmet
honors 28 years apart**


"Success is not as hard as you might think. One or two good choices each day can make all the difference," Clint Marshall said.

For Clint, and his son Calvin, those good choices have led not only to success on the football field, but to significant public recognition for their achievements.

Two weeks ago, Ogemaw Heights High School senior Calvin Marshall earned the Golden Helmet Player of the Year for Class B award, the same honor his father Clint received in 1997. That was the year the Falcons won the Class B State Championship in a shocking upset against Marshall High School.

"It (the award) kind of came as a shock," Calvin said. "My coach,

"Meals on Wheels doesn't deliver on Christmas, so we get a lot of requests from homebound adults," Chris said.

Remembering Pearl Harbor 84 years later

Early Sunday morning, Dec. 7, 1941, two waves of Japanese fighters, bombers and torpedo planes attacked Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

The first wave hit the fleet at anchor, sinking four battleships, including the USS Arizona. Many other ships were sunk or damaged. The second wave struck the naval base and airfields, destroying 169 planes.

In less than two hours, 2,403 Americans had been killed and 1,143 wounded.

The next day, President Franklin Roosevelt addressed Congress and, via radio, the nation:

"Yesterday, Dec. 7, 1941—a date which will live in infamy—the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the Empire of Japan."

He ended the speech with these words, "I ask that the Congress declare that since the unprovoked and dastardly attack by Japan... a state of war has existed between the United States and the Japanese Empire." Both the House

and Senate then voted in support and at 4 p.m., Dec. 8, 1941, President Roosevelt signed the declaration of war.

On the 84th anniversary of the "date which will live in infamy," the Ogemaw County Veterans Alliance held a ceremony in Irons Park to remember.

As the snow fell, they said a prayer, offered a gun salute and placed a wreath in Ogemaw Creek.

It was a fitting tribute remembering one of the darkest days in the history of the United States.

Amy Gildner Fransee shares artifacts and an update on the Forest Home Farm


I am really proud of my niece, Amy Gildner Fransee, and what a find she found in 2020 in the woods behind her house. I am so pleased that she is interested in "preserving her heritage." Her grandparents, Clifford and Doris Gildner, owned this property at one time. I did a story in 2020 about "Mystery in the Woods," but she has found and dug up so much more. It started out with the foundation of an old cabin with many pieces of wood from the cabin lying in this area.

Alan Cascadden came out with his metal detector the first visit and found small artifacts. She brought boxes to the museum to share with our school students from the Surline Middle School and homeschooled students. There was a flat iron used for ironing in perfect shape and a steel lid for a wood stove, cracked but it was all there. A glass dish with old buttons, beads and marbles. Two small clear glass bottles, Indian pottery, token from a Lewis Smaltz, old canning jar lids, wire, nails, pieces of rubber from a ball, black material, opera glasses, and a penny from 1937.

Amy has another interest in the property as they built their first home on the properties where she found the old cabin foundation and artifacts. She is now in charge of renting out the old bunkhouse for her grandparents, Roger and Linda Gildner. She rents it out for weddings, class reunions, showers, and other parties. Amy asked me if I could update her on the history of the Forest Home Farm and how it came to be.

So here is the history of the Forest Home Farm. One day I will update what happened to the next owners. I believe George Diebold owned the farm next and he was my great uncle.

In the 1860s Alfred Wright and R.H. Weidman, composed of the firm Wright and Weidman, took



up a large tract of land in Ogemaw County. In the year 1871 they stopped lumbering operations and made some clearing which they called the Forest Home Farm.

It was the headquarters for their lumbering business until Mr. Wright's death in 1873. Mr. Weidman was in Norway, his native land at this time, and remained there for about six years, which during that

time little progress was made at the farm. In 1880 D. Wright & Co. bought the half interest of the heirs of Alfred Wright and then the firm was known as R.H. Weidman & Co. Four hundred acres was cleared, and the large roomy, commodious buildings and other improvements were the results of his determination to make it one of the finest farms in the state.

The Forest Home Farms was part in West Branch and part in West Branch Township. The buildings were situated one mile from the village limits. The land was clay loam, and large crops were grown every year. The farm buildings consisted of the

farmhouse, three barns, a horse barn, carriage barn, granary, hog barn, tool shed, and a henry, all large and were conveniently arranged.

A spring of the purest water was piped into the farmhouse and throughout the farm buildings. No expense was spared to make sure everything was perfect. An orchard of about 1,000 trees contained all the various kinds of fruit suited to the

climate, including apples, plums, pears, cherries, crabapples and grapes. It was already making a good annual revenue after a few years.

About 100 head of cattle and 25-50 hogs were kept on the farm, besides the camp and farm horses belonging to the firm. The farm had the best creamery appliances in the cellar of the old bunkhouse and the highest grade of butter was produced in huge quantities. The plans were that after a few more years of cultivation, when the old stumps had been removed and the land brought under the plow, the Forest Home Farm would be one of the few farms in Michigan that was so grand!






Published in 2013, Steve Harvey featured it on his show in January 2015.


Jay's second book, "The Quirky Bathroom Book for Men Over 60," is sarcastically lighthearted, yet it addresses some hard truths facing men as they age.


A good dad, Jay became a union electrician, who played music when he could. Today he still fits in some gigs, mostly in and around Detroit with Crossing Woodward, a cover band that




Rose City celebrates the Christmas season



Chad Miller, told me before the list was released. It's so rare and such a great feeling."

For 61 years, the Bay City Times and Reyes Coca-Cola Bottling of Bay City have teamed up to honor the area's top performers each week during the high school football season. Then, at the end of the season, they select the Golden Helmet Players of the Year, one for each of four classes based on school enrollment size.

"I liked the camaraderie and the bond with the other players," Calvin said. "I really enjoyed the hard work and taking a leadership role."

"This award speaks volumes about Calvin's performance and his ability to be consistent," Klint said. "I'm a pretty proud dad. I wanted my son to have the best season, and the team had an outstanding year. They set their eyes on and worked toward the playoffs. There were a lot of great parents around to support them, and we enjoyed watching the team succeed. Support is so important."

"My best advice for next year's team is to always trust their coaches and teammates," Calvin said. "And always play for the guy next to them. You get out of the game what you put into it." As fullback and defensive tackle for the Falcons, Calvin's 2025

football season was certainly an embodiment of that advice.

"In several games, but especially against Swan Valley, I could see the sheer determination and will not to be denied," Klint said. "You can't coach that. That's a character thing; the desire to fight for your team is either inside a player or it's not. And this season it was present in my son, and in several OHHS players."

Calvin has already shown himself, his teammates, and the community what can be achieved through hard work, willpower, leadership and a focus on teamwork on and off the field. The Golden Helmet award attests to that.




